David Nutt is a psychiatrist and the Edmund J. Safra Professor of Neuropsychopharmacology in the Division of Brain Science, Dept of Medicine, Hammersmith Hospital, Imperial College London. Here he uses a range of brain imaging techniques to

explore the causes of addiction and other psychiatric disorders and to search for new treatments. He has published numerous original research papers, and reviews and books chapters, as well as 30 books, including one for the general public, Drugs: without the hot air, that won the Transmission Prize in 2014. He is currently the President of the European Brain Council and Founding Chair of DrugScience.org.uk (formerly the Independent Scientific Committee on Drugs (ISCD).

Speakers:

Ian McGregor

Tain McGregor is Professor of Psychopharmacology, NHMRC Principal Research Fellow and Director of the Psychopharmacology Laboratory at the University of Sydney. Iain's research focuses on the effects of recreational drugs and prescription drugs on brain and behaviour and also involves development of new medications for the treatment of various diseases. His research spans medicinal chemistry, the use of cellular assays and preclinical animal models of disease, and also clinical trials in humans. Iain has a strong interest in the area of medicinal cannabis and cannabinoids and is Director of Preclinical Research at the Lambert Initiative for Cannabinoid Therapeutics at the University of Sydney.

David is Chair of Psychiatry at St Vincent's Health and The University of Melbourne. He has wide clinical and research interests, encompassing schizophrenia and related disorders, bipolar disorder, cannabis abuse, OCD spectrum disorders and disorders of body image. He has published over 600 papers and chapters; and 22 books. His broader interests include music, literature, theatre and art.

Yvonne Bonomo is a Physician in Addiction Medicine and Director of the Department of Addiction Medicine at St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne. She works with people with alcohol and drug problems through clinical practice, research and professional and community education. She is Associate Professor in Medicine at the University of Melbourne and also Medical Head of the Women's Alcohol and Drug Service (WADS). She serves on the board of YSAS (Youth Health Advocacy Service) and has served on the Board of the Australian Drug Foundation. Yvonne has filled a number of roles on the behalf of the Australasian Chapter of Addiction Medicine (AChAM), Royal Australasian College of Physicians including Chair of Education and President of AChAM. She is also an Expert Advisor to the World Health Organisation (WHO) Western Pacific Regional Office on alcohol and substance use in young people.

Anthony (Tony) Gill,

Anthony (Tony) Gill is a Senior Staff Specialist in the Alcohol and Drug Service at St Vincent's Hospital Sydney, and Medical Director of the Central Coast Local Health District Drug and Alcohol Service. He is Co-Chair of the NSW Agency of Clinical Innovation Drug and Alcohol Network, and Vice President/President-Elect of APSAD. He has worked in the Drug and Alcohol field in a range of roles for over 25 years and is now working primarily as a clinician.

Tiffany Plummer

Tiffany Plummer is the Aggression Coordinator at St Vincent's Hospital Melbourne and a Hospital Afterhours Coordinator. She is responsible for programs to train employees in aggression prevention and management strategies as well as to investigate critical incidents of aggression. She chairs the Aggression Prevention Management Committee and is currently a member of the DHSS Violence in Healthcare Reference Group as well as a member on the DHSS Physical Restraint

Nga Tran

Nga is the Pharmacist In-Charge/Specialist Mental Health Pharmacist at SVMH and the Honorary Fellow at Department of Psychiatry at The University of Melbourne. Since 1997 she has been involved in a significant number of projects aimed at enhancing medication concordance. She is also the project manager of www.asmile.org.au: a one-stop-shop web-based mental health information for consumers, carers and mental health clinicians.

The Command has 24 specialist work units within its seven Divisions, which include the Organised Crime, State Anti-Gangs, Finance & Cybercrime, Serious Crime Operations, Serious Crime (Sexual and Family Violence), Specialist Support and Operations Support Divisions.

Jenny has long been a passionate advocate for harm reduction approaches to drug use and to drug law reform Jenny has worked on a wide range of peer-based research and education initiatives across Australia and Asia in the areas of HIV, viral hepatitis & injecting drug use. Jenny is currently employed as the Executive Officer at Harm Reduction Victoria (formerly VIVAIDS), the drug user organisation for Victoria.
